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GUIDANCE TO USE

Slang words and terminology are used in a criminal context and can often be indicators of involvement in gangs and criminal activity. Many children and young people who are criminally exploited will use terms they've picked up from specific involvement within gangs, serious violence, drug trafficking and other forms of illicit activity. As professionals, understanding these colloquialisms - and knowing how to decipher and contextualise them - can be beneficial when identifying those at risk, contextually safeguarding service users and implementing cultural competency in professional practice.

St Giles' SOS+ Service has produced this Slang Dictionary containing a comprehensive list of words, terminology and phrases, with examples of how they're used in sentences. This is not an alphabetical glossary but a dictionary which compartmentalises words/phrases within subcategories as there are multiple ways of saying the same thing in slang e.g. in this dictionary there are 20 different words and/or terms used to refer to a knife or bladed article. If you're searching for the meaning of a specific word, you have overheard or come across, we recommend pressing 'CTRL-F' to access the navigation function and type the word in the navigation bar. However, it is worth bearing in mind that there is no general consensus on the correct spelling of slang terminology and you may need to try various forms of the word. This information has been compiled and quality assured by a dedicated team of practitioners with lived experience in the criminal justice system - former perpetrators and/or survivors of gangs, exploitation and violence - utilising their first-hand knowledge of gang culture and the esoteric nuances within the criminal world to ensure this resource is accurate, authentic and credible.

When referring to this dictionary it is of paramount significance that discretion is applied to avoid inadvertently demonising and criminalising young people. A young person's lexis and word choice does not definitively determine that they are at risk - or already being - exploited. Generally speaking, the vernacular in our national youth culture incorporates slang. Even slang terms that originally derive from criminal code - meaning they were made by and used by criminals - have undergone a semantic shift and are used by pro-social, law-abiding citizens in everyday speech e.g. The word 'trap' as a verb means to sell drugs; however the meaning has transitioned into popular mainstream youth culture and now means to 'work', therefore someone can say they're 'trapping' and imply that they are simply just working hard at their legitimate job as a construction worker. Many young people will also use slang to sound cool, feel accepted within their friendship circles or due to cultural influence. Modern day slang in the UK is an amalgamation of criminal code combined with cockney rhyming slang, American rap influences, environmental influences, Caribbean patois, and key phrases from other cultures. It's also important to understand that one slang term can have multiple meanings depending on the context; making it even more ambiguous and harder to decode. For example, the letter 'G' can mean 'friend/peer', 'fellow gang-member', 'grand' as in £1000, or 'gram' referring to the measurement of a drug.

When hearing a young person refer to specific measurements, detailed drug transactions, engaging in conversations describing serious violence, or using key phrases within cybercrime; you could infer that what they're saying goes beyond trying to sound 'cool' or simply reciting 'lyrics' from music where illicit activity is being glamourised. Nevertheless, we recommend that this is weighed up against other intelligence, evidence, signs and indicators to avoid criminalisation. It is important to acknowledge that criminal slang is always being updated and modified and therefore we recommend using the latest version of this resource which will be updated on a semi-annual basis.
